We have a walk-in clinic for people who have been denied benefits under the Ontario Disability Support Program on Tuesdays from 9:30am to 11:30 am and 1:30 pm to 3:30 pm, at the legal clinic.\*

## About us:

Kingston Community Legal Clinic (KCLC) is a non-profit community legal clinic. We serve low income residents of the City of Kingston, Townships of South Frontenac and Frontenac Islands.

KCLC is funded primarily by Legal Aid Ontario. We also employ an Eviction Prevention Worker, who is funded through Human Resources and Skills Development Canada under the Homelessness Partnering Strategy. That funding is administered by the United Way. The clinic is governed by a volunteer, community-based Board of Directors.

KCLC provides a variety of services including legal advice, legal representation, public legal education, and community development. We also carry out law reform initiatives.
